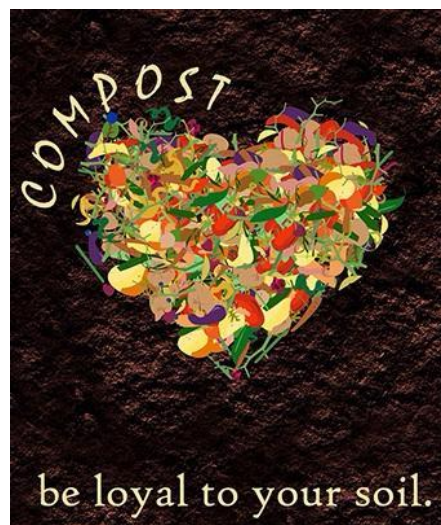

It is Simple to Start Composting

September and October are the best months to start composting because the leaves create a great base. A compost can be as simple as leaves, twigs and grass clippings or it can include some food scraps. Either way, it offers a way for you to naturally recapture the nutrients your trees and lawn need. As the leaves, twigs and grass degrade, they become a soil-like substance that you can spread generously on garden beds or lightly on the lawn, allowing these nutrients to return to your soil! 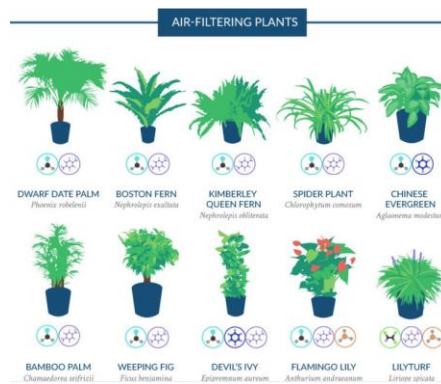

A new law intended to encourage schools to donate food, HB5530, was signed on July 15 and is immediately effective. The Food Donation for Schools and Public Agencies prohibits schools and public agencies from signing contracts that restrict unused food from being donated to food pantries or soup kitchens! Let's face it, kids are picky eaters and sometimes they prefer to be more social, leaving many items untouched. Instead of sending those foods to the landfill, they can be donated or composted!

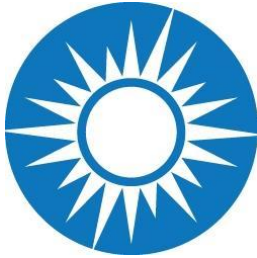
